Its aims are self-discovery and mastery of "who" many of us want to be in the short-, mid- and long-term. I have heard many times that it is not the

arrival at the finish line but the lesson learned along the road that is important, that part of the journey that teaches us values and the price we have to pay to move ahead to reach, one- by-one, the next educational level, the changes that make us a different person than the one we were when we started.

could have done it differently, and promise yourself to try that new way next time.

Since we are not playing a finite game but an ever-evolving and changing one, what matters is the road ahead and the opportunities that will continue to present if we persist in the quest of reaching One Level UP. Whether you are still on the legacy Competent Communication Program or have decided to embrace the new Toastmasters Pathways Program, it's not the curriculum that determines your growth but what you do every day and the brick that you lay every day on the wall of your success that determine the final structure that will support your new "YOU."

Counting from the day I am writing, there are 220 days ahead in the road that the District has started under this current team, and the opportunities to become a Distinguished District are everywhere. The real challenge, however, is not what District 83 can do, but what you, the reader, sees as the outcome of your current initiatives and fulfillment goals.

## District Quality Director's Message Step Out of Your Comfort Zone By Lynda Starr, DTM

Many of us like to stay within our comfort zone and we convince ourselves that we have everything we need within the zone and do not need to stray from there. Once we take the chance and move beyond our fears of failure, being the center of attention and other issues, and venture outside the



borders, we may find that, although it initially makes us ill at ease, we may reap some benefits. This obviously relates to our Toastmasters experience and how it can push us out of our comfort zone. In my September article, I discussed my initiative of "Try something new." New can be Pathways, which is new for all of us, a new role in the club or district, or new speaking techniques.

The benefits of trying something new may be external items such as earning an educational designation or becoming a club or district officer, or internal items such as discovering something about ourselves, gaining self-confidence, and opening the door to new opportunities as our comfort zone expands. The journey of moving outside one's comfort zone is one of discomfort, excitement, one step forward, one step back, and pushing yourself to the edge.

We all have multiple parts to our personalities, and we adapt different personas to fit various situations, such as parent, boss, or enthusiastic mentor. Although we can bring different facets of our lives out, we cannot pretend to be something that we are not, because it is very emotionally draining. Integrating our parts is a lifelong process as we develop new interests, grow and enter new phases of our lives.

Here are some tips when it comes time to step out of the comfort zone:

- Everyone has his/her own problems, issues and responsibilities, and there is no need to be self-conscious because very few people are paying as much attention to you as you think.
- New challenges will help you to grow and learn something new about yourself and the world.
- You can learn from failure. What could you have done differently? How can you take what you learned and use it for the next new comfort-zone expansion?
- Moving out of your comfort zone for one challenge will make you more open to new possibilities and more self-confident about the next change that comes along.



What keeps us in our comfort zones? Is it fear of failure or the potential that you won't like what happens? In either case, the best strategy is to pick yourself up and move on to the next challenge. You may be afraid to compete in a contest because you think you will forget your speech. Preparation is key to success. Find yourself a mentor who can help you practice your speech so that remembering it becomes second-nature.

When writing this article, I came across a TEDx talk from Ken Hughes. In the talk he explained how every day during 2014 he stepped out of his comfort zone to do something new. While some of his tasks may be beyond the realm of possibility for many of us, such as piercing someone's ears or wearing only a towel to the supermarket, the concept is intriguing and can be applied to our own lives on a smaller scale as we take risks and remain open to new opportunities, find new ways to solve problems, or even just make small changes on a daily basis, such as speaking up at a status meeting, trying a new food, or reading a book instead of watching TV. As PQD, I do new things almost daily, taking a new role at a contest, negotiating contracts with hotels, or needing to apply the wisdom of Solomon to solve a division dilemma. Definitely put the experience in the scary but rewarding category. My advice to you: Find what thing scares you and try to do it, whether in Toastmasters or another part of your life.

# Toastmasters Speech Contests Change To Affect the International Speech Contest

Most speech contests have four levels: club, area, division, and district. At this point in the Toastmasters year, we have completed most of the division level contests in Table Topics and Humorous Speeches. Soon we will be starting the contest cycle again at the club level with the Evaluation Contest and the International Speech Contest.

This year for the first time, all four contests will proceed to district level at a single event -- the District 83 Annual Conference at the APA Hotel Woodbridge on May 4 and 5, 2019.

Did you know that the International Speech Contest is the only contest that continues past the district level? In prior years, the district winner participated in a semifinal at the Toastmasters International Convention. The winner of each semifinal contest then competed in the World Championship of Public Speaking. However, with 106 districts and 10 semifinals in 2018, this has become a challenge to administer.

As of this year, Toastmasters International has introduced an intermediate level to the competition: the region quarterfinal.

At our District Conference, the International Speech Contest speeches will be videotaped. Afterwards, the video of the winner's speech will be submitted to Toastmasters International for voting in a region quarterfinal. In July 2019, the first-place winner from each 14 Toastmasters regions will be invited to participate in the semifinals (and hopefully the finals) at the 2019 Toastmasters Convention to be held in Denver, Colorado from August 21 to 24, alleviating some of the administrative entanglements currently faced at the international level.



# Pathways Education Pathways Live Sessions

On September 22, 2018 District 83 hosted a Pathways Live drop-in, a hands-on learning session to assist Toastmasters eager to explore more of what Pathways offers.



Pathways Guides Anne Gilson, DTM, PDG, Lynda Starr, DTM, PQD, and Janette Alexander, DTM, District Administration Mgr., discuss ideas for Base Camp Managers. The session was inspired by Geoff Heath, CC,CL, a former member of three clubs in District 83 looking to create a similar session for members in his area as his High Performance Leadership (HPL) project.

This summer Geoff was relocated to Connecticut with his family for his work in the United States Coast Guard. A few of the Pathways Guides in Talk of Monmouth, one of Geoff's clubs, decided to pursue Geoff's idea to be able to ProACTIVEly EmPOWER members of District 83.

Pathways rolled out on May 15, 2018 in District 83. We learned that members had questions now that they didn't have when their Guides and Ambassadors visited their clubs before the rollout. New Base Camp Managers

started their terms of office beginning July 1, 2018. Some might not have been officers when the Virtual Support Sessions began prior to the Pathways rollout.

Club members who joined Toastmasters after the May rollout need support, guidance and mentoring, and all members need to be familiar with Pathways to help answer questions.

Twelve people, including District officers and Pathways Guides, participated in the office-hours, drop-in session held at the Middletown Library Computer Lab in Middletown, NJ. Attendees were invited to bring their own laptops/tablets or use a laptop from the library. We had a mix of both options.



This was followed by an optional 25-minute, lecture-style instructional session in PowerPoint format for Base Camp Managers, facilitated by Anne.

Guides and Ambassadors assisted participants with the following:

- Taking assessments and selecting paths.
- Navigating Base Camp.
- Showing Base Camp Managers resources available to help members of their clubs.
- Sharing best practices with other Guides and Ambassadors to assist club members, as well as providing inspiration for future Pathways Live sessions.

- Discussing the two-step process for Level completion and submitting awards to District Central on the Toastmasters International site for DCP educational credit.
- Displaying use of the E-portfolio to store completed speech evaluations using a meaningful naming convention for files from two different paths in the Level 1 folder.
- Answering frequently asked questions; for instance:

# What are the new Pathways education designations along the track to DTM as compared to our traditional designations (CL, ALB, etc)?

<u>Answer</u>: if a member named John Doe, for example, completed Presentation Mastery, Level 1, he would be recognized as John Doe, PM1. As he completes the next Level and advances through Levels 2-4, he earns the next Level number. When John completes a Path (after Level 5), he is considered Proficient and adds the two-letter path abbreviation, John Doe, PM Proficient. Once John completes all the requirements for DTM, he becomes John Doe, DTM.

Feedback from the Middletown session will help District 83 plan future sessions. The District plans to host at least one Pathways Live session in each Division, as recommended by Program Quality Director Lynda Starr, DTM.

District Director Manny Reyes, DTM stated, "I am very happy with the outcome today. This is the start of a new course of action that we should embrace and keep moving forward. When we create the grounds for club members to come and be instructed by experts in the subject, progress takes place."



Immediate Past District Director Janice Buffalow, DTM is working with Pathways Guides and Ambassadors who have recently completed their terms of office to help members continue to move forward with Pathways.

She suggests the clubs set aside time to sign up members at a meeting. She has heard some clubs are doing this on a regular basis, and it is working well. Additionally, she has put on both of her clubs' FreeToastHost tool under Member Downloads several of the documents which cover Base Camp, the ten Paths, how-to's, etc. and is trying to spend time with members at each meeting.

The candidate interview date is tentatively set for March 2<sup>nd</sup>. More details will be available to the candidates in February.

The DLC Nominations Report will be published on the District website tm83.org at least four weeks prior to the Annual Meeting.

Pres (Presiyan) Vasiliev, 2013 World Champion of Public Speaking (WCPS), joined District 83 as the keynote speaker for the District 83 Fall Celebration: Recognizing Success! (for individual members and clubs) on Saturday, November 17. He brought his enthusiasm and personal strategies for successful speaking along with valuable tips on how to deliver our own stories.



In his keynote speech, he talked about his road to the championship, which began with the first speech he made in Toastmasters. After he completed his icebreaker, he wanted to try evaluating a speaker to help with his goal of becoming a better speaker. The evaluation went so well that his club members encouraged him to compete in the Evaluation Contest, which he won. He then began work on a speech for the International competition.

When practicing to be a champion, Pres advises never to pass up an opportunity to deliver your speech. He also notes the importance of finding the message for your speech in your heart and to let that emotion show as you believe in and deliver your speech.

Pres also delivered a workshop, offering seven secrets for successful storytelling. Without giving away too many spoilers, he stressed the following:

Setting: describe the time and place in which the story occurs.

Description: use a combination of abstract and concrete words to describe situations.

Characters: make your characters come alive and connect with your audience.
